CCE regional pilot program a success for head coaches and assistant coaches

ATLANTA (August 19, 2015) - The Women's Basketball Coaches Association hosted the regional pilot program for The Center for Coaching Excellence last week at the Atlanta Airport Marriott Gateway, running a two-day session for head coaches followed by a two-day session for assistant coaches. The program was funded in part by a grant from the NCAA.

The Atlanta pilot is the WBCA's first attempt to open The Center for Coaching Excellence to the full membership, including collegiate assistant and high school coaches, in a regional setting with the goal of expanding the program to other parts of the country in future years. The Center for Coaching Excellence was founded in 2011 through a partnership between Columbia University and the WBCA, and was developed by former Columbia athletics director Dr. M. Dianne Murphy, now the university's advisor on athletics issues, and Dr. Cathie Siders, a clinical psychologist, organizational consultant and executive coach. Until now the program was conducted exclusively on Columbia's campus in New York City.

Coaches attending The Center for Coaching Excellence learn through collaborative and interactive learning sessions, along with lectures and panel discussions featuring experts in college athletics. The Center for Coaching Excellence also provides coaches valuable networking opportunities with their peers and industry leaders.

"The Center for Coaching Excellence pilot programs expanded the WBCA's educational footprint and provided executive leadership training for head and assistant coaches," said WBCA Executive Director Danielle M. Donehew. "It is with great pride that we adjusted our 36 head coach program at Columbia University to serve 84 head and assistant coaches in Atlanta. Dr. Murphy and Dr. Siders were simply masterful — their unique and thoughtful approach to teaching leadership, best practices, and maximizing individual talents continues to be invaluable in the classroom.

"We are fortunate to have a foundational CCE model that has evolved and strengthened over the past five years. To date, we have had just under 300 head coaches and 49 assistant coaches complete the program. We are eager to bring this program to an even larger segment of our membership. Ultimately, the WBCA Board of Directors is committed to formalizing our entire learning platform in order to provide a continuum of learning spanning each coach's career."
