Message to our

Dear member,

The WBCA Board of Directors and staff are pleased to share with you this annual report for the 2019-20 membership year. The report summarizes the association's status and activities from Sept. 1, 2019, through Aug. 31, 2020.

It was not what any of us had planned. From the COVID-19 pandemic to the social unrest that followed the tragic death of George Floyd, the events of 2019-20 shook our association, our sport and our nation in ways we could not have possibly imagined. For our sport it was a year without championships; for our association a year without convention. Our response:

- When convention was abruptly canceled for reasons of health and safety, we quickly pivoted and produced the Power Hour — 18 hours of quality online programming featuring the top coaches and industry leaders in our sport that we rolled out over four weeks in April. The cooperative efforts of our membership helped the WBCA mitigate a major financial setback.
- When the nation was shaken by the tragic death of George Floyd, we quickly acted to show support for our black coaches and student-athletes by condemning racism and forming a new Social Justice Task Force to help lead our fight against it.

The challenges that began during the 2019-20 membership year will remain with us into and possibly throughout the coming year. Through it all, we are certain our membership will continue to pull together in unity of purpose and voice that reaffirms no matter what setbacks may befall us together we can and will endure.

Integrity

- We follow both the letter and spirit of the rules and regulations that govern our sport.
- We watch for actions that could influence other coaches, staff members, athletes and fans to behave in a way that is contrary to these standards.
- We report conduct or suspected conduct that is not in keeping with these standards as well as the rules and regulations that govern our sport.
- We acknowledge that winning is important, but never at the expense of sportsmanship, safety and integrity.

Athlete experience

- We place the physical and mental well-being of the women and girls who play basketball above all else; their health and safety is paramount.
- We maintain strictly professional relationships with the athletes with whom we interact.
- We respect the dignity and individuality of each person with whom we interact and promote a diverse and inclusive culture in which every individual is valued.

Education & empowerment

- We teach by example and instill in our athletes the fundamental values of honesty, integrity, respect, civility, self-discipline, personal responsibility and fairness.
- We educate women and girls in a manner that prepares them to succeed in life and become leaders in their communities.
- We strive in all we do to expand athlete experiences and support their academic and educational interests.



Professionalism

- We perform with excellence and good sportsmanship and require the same of each other and our athletes.
- We commit to growing and enhancing the sport of women's basketball and seek opportunities to grow personally and professionally.
- We respect the game, fellow coaches, administrators, game officials and the women and girls we coach and teach.

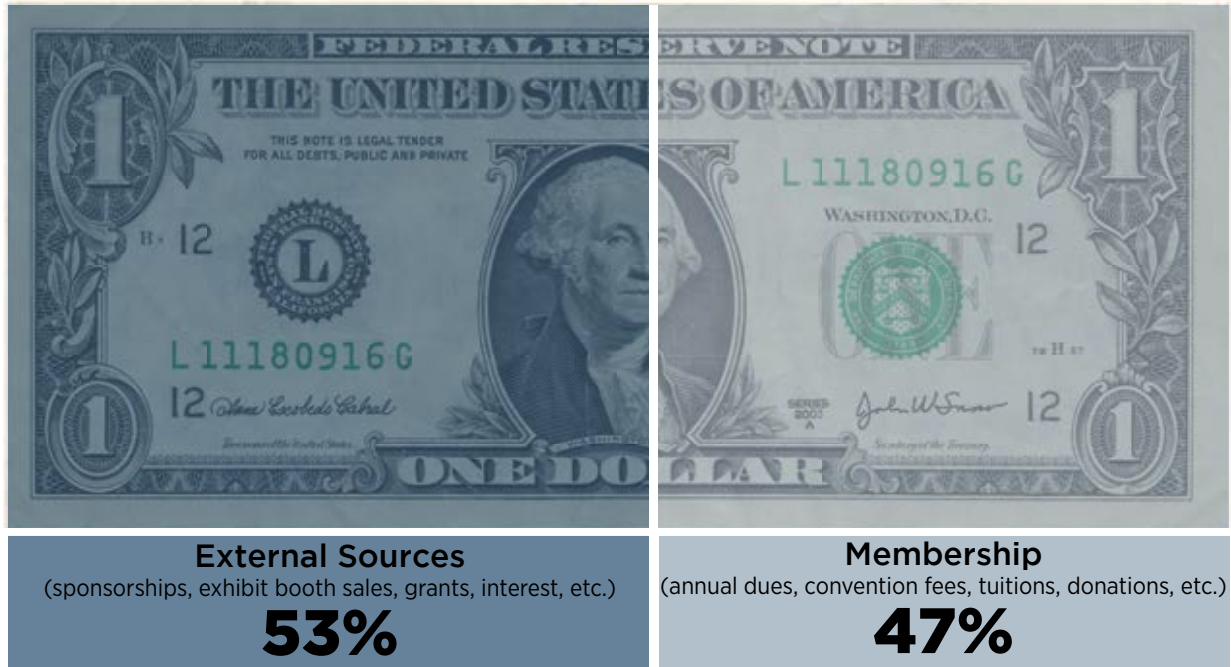

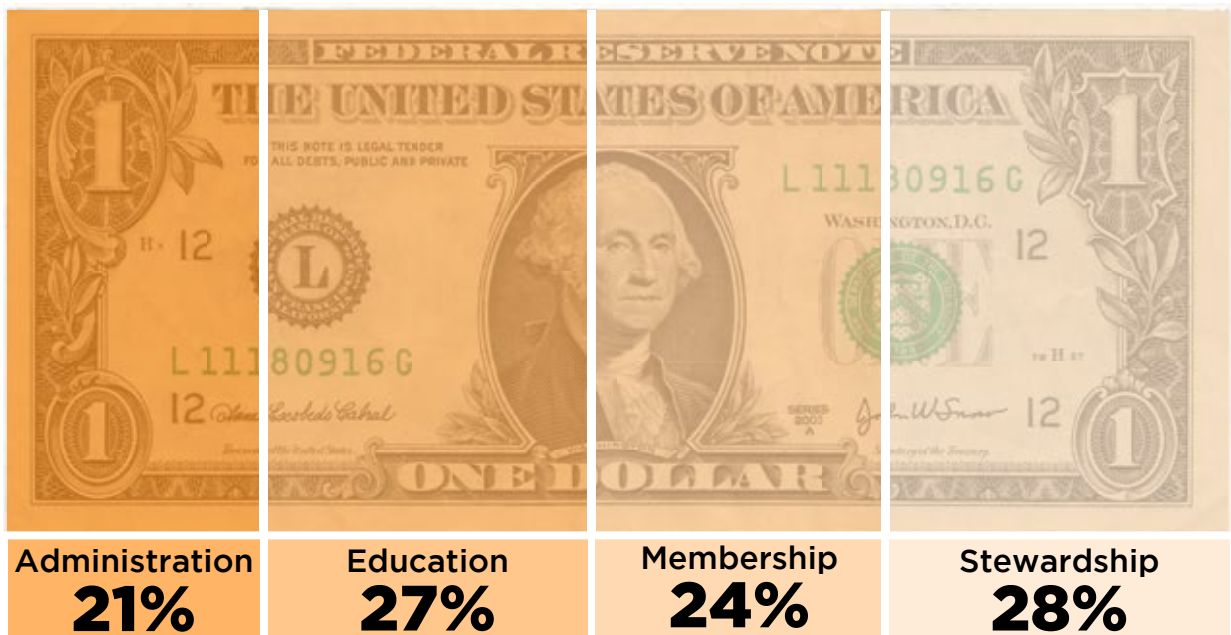
OUR BUDGET

COVID-19

WBCA sought input from members, kept them informed, and represented their positions to decisionmakers as governing bodies reacted to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Virtual town halls



The WBCA conducted its first-ever virtual town halls in Summer 2020. The town halls provided members with the most up-to-date information and the opportunity to ask questions on a variety of topics. More than 1,500 members attended at least one of the three town halls. An additional 179 members watched video recordings of the various town halls.

- **NCAA Division I Town Hall (June 24)**
Legislative process, recruiting, summer access in the COVID-19 pandemic.
- **NCAA Division III Virtual Town Hall (July 14)**
Scheduling, regional alignments, playing season, championship, all-star game.

Membership surveys

The WBCA conducted three surveys of various groups within the membership to ascertain their positions on matters pertaining to the COVID-19 pandemic.

- **Survey of NCAA Division II & III Head Coaches (May 18)**
Positions and general information sought on recruiting, camps and budgets.
- **Survey of NCAA Division I Head Coaches (June 30)**
Position sought on recruiting calendars for September 2020 if temporary recruiting dead period were to be lifted.
- **Survey of all NCAA Division I Coaches (Aug. 26)**
Positions sought on possible recruiting calendar options if temporary recruiting dead period is lifted on Jan. 1.



Weekly email updates



The WBCA initiated a new weekly email to the membership that highlighted the week's developments relating to the COVID-19 pandemic and the activities of both the association and the sport's governing bodies as they reacted to it. Beginning Friday, March 13, two days after the association announced it would cancel the 2020 convention, the weekly COVID-19 email update was sent for 24 consecutive Fridays during the 2019-20 membership year with plans to continue it until the effects of the pandemic on the association and the sport subside.

SOCIAL JUSTICE

WBCA joined black coaches and student-athletes in condemning racism and used the association's public platforms to begin to help make a difference.

WBCA actions ...

- Issued a statement condemning racism in the wake of the death of George Floyd.
- Formed a new Social Justice Task Force to address systemic and institutional racism and oppression by developing and launching initiatives in training and advocacy, continuing education, and hiring practices.
- Presented relevant programming, including:
 - “A Time for Action” panel discussion on contemporary race relations moderated by Cleveland Cavaliers sideline reporter Angel Gray and featuring Geno Auriemma (Connecticut), Muffet McGraw (Notre Dame, retired), Carolyn Peck (ESPN), and Dawn Staley (South Carolina).
 - “Breaking Barriers” moderated by ESPN sports analyst LaChina Robinson and featuring Niele Ivey (Notre Dame) and Kenny Brooks (Virginia Tech).
 - “Coaches Creating Change: The Mississippi State Flag” podcast featuring Nikki McCray-Penson (Mississippi State) and Yolett McPhee-McCuin (Mississippi).
- Expanded the Diversity & Inclusion page on WBCA.org to include print, audio and video resources on racism for coaches.
- Publicly supported the West Coast Conference’s ‘Russell Rule’ on hiring practices within WCC member institutions’ athletics departments.
- Endorsed the AthleticDirectorU Collegiate Coaching Diversity Pledge — an opt-in pledge by NCAA Division I athletics directors to include a diverse group of candidates in the finalist pool for head coach vacancies in women’s and men’s basketball and football.

On Aug. 3, 2020, the WBCA launched the Take Charge and Vote campaign to promote the importance of voting and to help with conversations coaches were having with their teams.

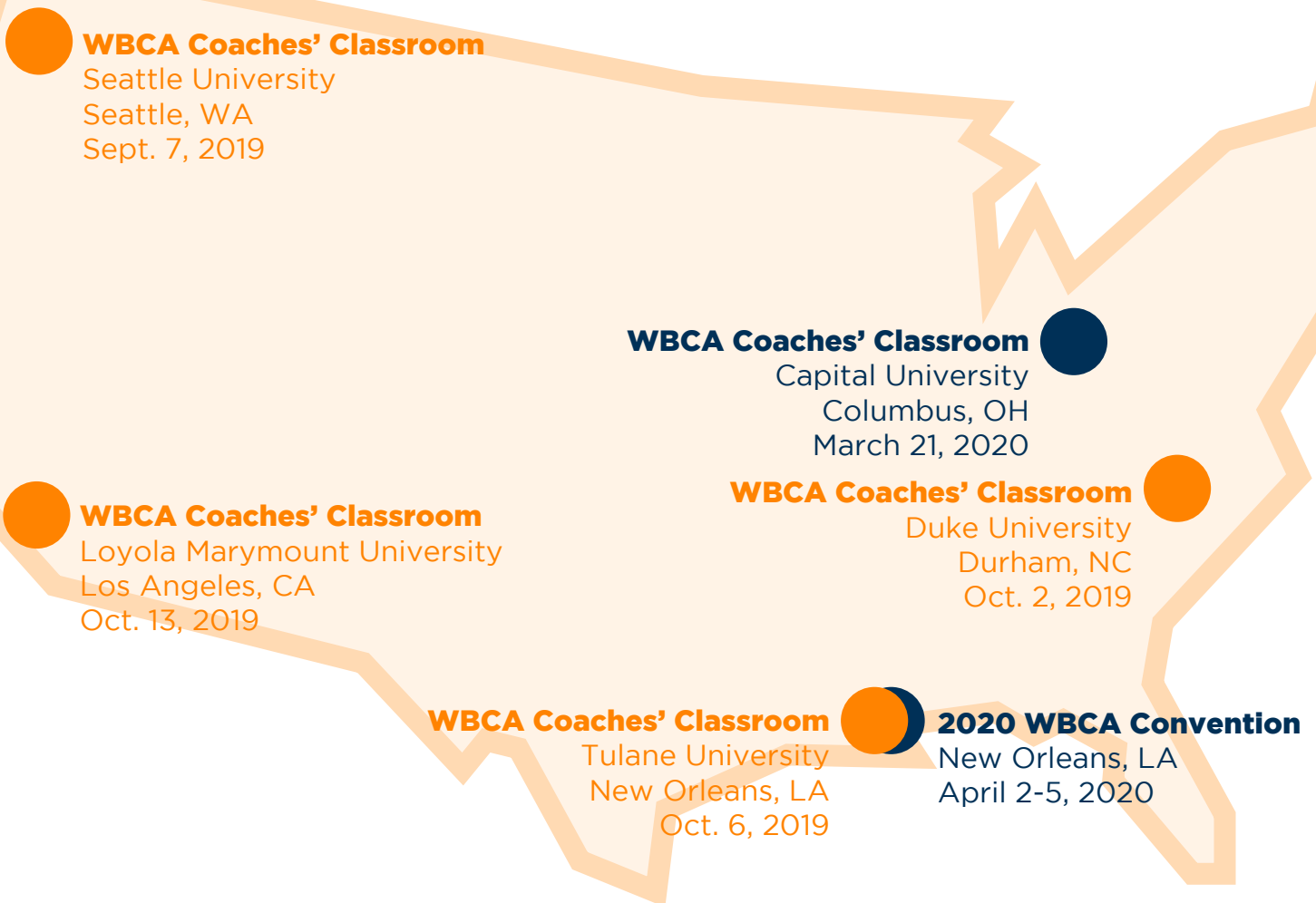
Every day through National Voter Registration Day on Sept. 22, the association shared on its social media platforms history, facts and statistics on suffrage in the U.S.

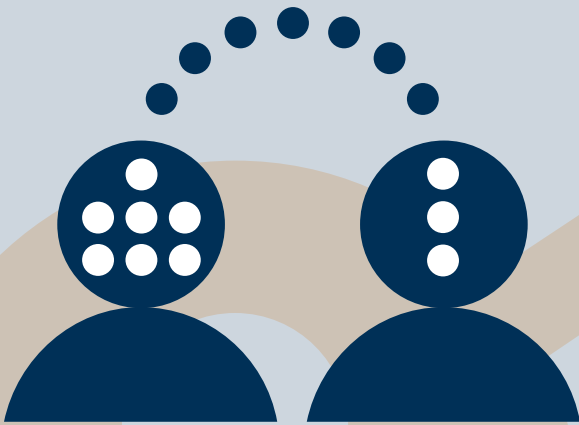

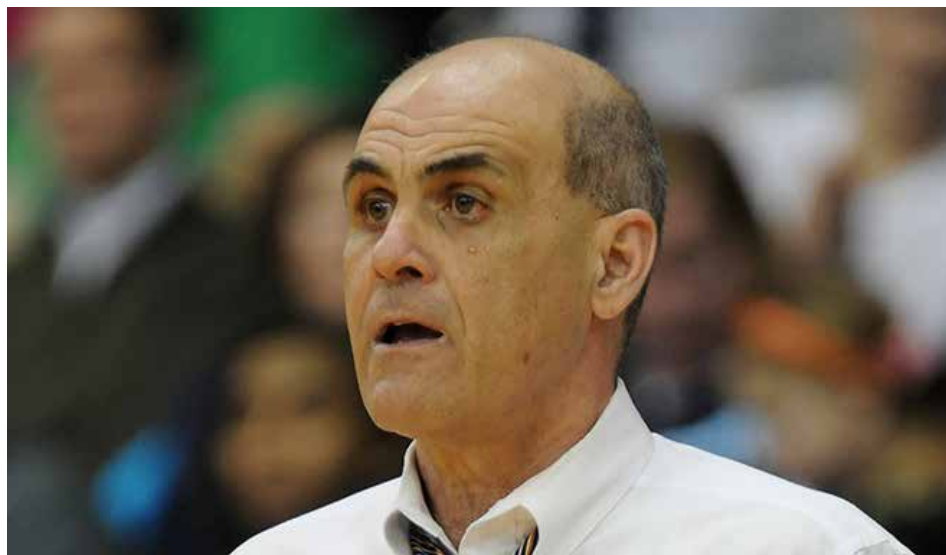

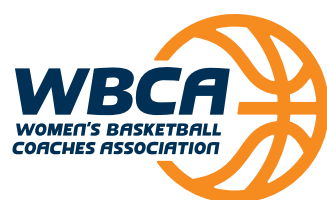
